Covenant University Enactus Team Emerges Second Best Nationwide

he Covenant University Enactus Team has emerged second place winner among the 24 higher institutions that competed at the Enactus Nigeria National Competition, which took place between July 4 and 6, 2017, in Lagos.

The 35-man Covenant University's

Enactus Team came tops at the group stage and the semi-finals level where they won a stunning upset over the 7 times back-to-back winner of the competition, Kaduna Polytechnic, Kaduna to qualify for the finals, where they emerged second best.

Speaking on behalf of the Team, the

trio of Synka Jyte-Davis (Lead Presenter), Asekomhe Kenefel (Project Manager) and Olabinjo Segun, attributed their feet to the intensive engagement in social enterprise and the success of their projects, the Eco-bag and Tunse' Platform.

Synka (Lead Presenter) explained that the Eco-bag is a temperature retention bag that helps maintains the temperature of food or any other substance in the bag for 72 hours while 'Tunse' is a native Yourba word for 'fix it' or 'repair it'. "It is an online on-demand platform that connects blue-collar workers and artisans to customers of closest proximity who desire their services.

Kenefel (Project Manager) stated that the Team with some implementation partners was able to train widows to produce the Eco-bag, provided access to capital to start production and connect them to potential markets. The results, according to him, was a reduction in

ovenant University and Merck Group, a leading science and technology company in healthcare, life science and performance materials, have resolved to explore the feasibility of both organisations teaming up on mutually beneficial endeavours.

The resolution was reached on Tuesday, July 4, 2017, when representatives of Merck Group paid a courtesy visit to the Management of Covenant University.

Mr. Matthias Getrost, Head of Africa, Merck Group, who led the three-man team from the company, said that Merck has the desire to be part of Covenant University's Vision of becoming one of the top 10 universities in the world by the year

2022. His company, he added, was trying to make bold footprints in Sub-Saharan Africa, part of which is seeking partnership with universities.

Mr. Getrost went on to make a presentation on the profile of Merck Group and its services, which features Healthcare, Life Science and Performance Materials, and the commitment of 1.7 billion Euros into research and development. The company, he added, is involved in different activities across Africa in the areas of Malaria/HIV, Educational Development, Diabetes and Cancer, and Partnership with Seeding Laboratories among others.

Shedding more light on the purpose of the visit, the Head of Research, Merck Group, Mr. Kingsley Udoakpan, who affirmed Merck's long research collaboration with universities, added that the company is strong in different research areas, just as he acknowledged that Covenant University has the infrastructure and brain power. He suggested that both organisations should start something refreshingly new together. "We can bring your university in contact with our researchers," he said.

Covenant, Tshwane Varsity Sign MoU on Sustainable Energy Solutions

ovenant University and Tshwane University of Technology (TUT), Pretoria, South Africa, have strengthened their existing relationship with the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU).

The MoU, signed on Monday, July 3, 2017, between the Management of Covenant University and representatives of TUT, will see the latter's Centre for Energy and Electric Power (CEEP) working in concert with researchers in Covenant's Departments of Mechanical Engineering and Electrical and Information Engineering in finding solutions to energy challenges.

Speaking at the MoU signing ceremony, Leader of the Tshwane University delegation, Professor Patricia Popoola, who expressed excitement that her university was going into a formal agreement with Covenant University, said that TUT had hitherto had a fruitful relationship with Covenant in the area of research publications. The latest development, she added, is a step forward for both institutions.

Her colleague, Dr. Olawale Popoola, while making a brief presentation on CEEP, which he heads, revealed that the centre is into giving solutions. The main emphasis, he explained, is looking into diminishing energy reserves in Africa, then examine things that can bring about sustainable energy.

CEEP, he said, looks at issues like

balancing and supply, value chain, and young entrepreneurs. According to him, CEEP is interested in innovating and implementing sustainable energy solution and resource, and using University staff and students as outlet to carry out research and contract work.

Dr. Popoola added that CEEP's initiative provides additional income for partnering universities and the centre is interested in conducting cutting edge research. "We hope Covenant University will come with us and together, we can provide solutions," he emphasized.

Giving an insight into the genesis of the MoU, the Head, Department of Mechanical Engineering, Covenant University, Dr. Oluseyi Ajayi, said that faculty members of both universities had previously worked together on research projects, but earlier in 2017, he made a proposal to Professor Patricia Popoola on the feasibility of having a College to College collaboration because great researchers abound at Covenant University. He said that a discussion was also held on having faculty exchange.

Following the signing of the MoU, the Vice-Chancellor, Covenant University, Professor AAA. Atayero, in his remarks, described it as a wonderful thing because, according to him, it was a lesson on how MoUs should be done. He said that the relationship between the

the cost of doing business, economic empowerment of 30 widows and increase profits to grow their business, sitting one Mrs Egbadun, a cold drink seller as a successful beneficiary.

On 'Tunse', Olabinjo explained that the Team partnered with various artisan groups and associations to register artisans, which they named T-workers and got customers to book them using the platform. This, he said, led to the registration of over 350 artisans on the platform and connection between them and their customers. He mentioned the success story of Joshua, a 19 year old beneficiary who through the platform got many job opportunities and was able to sponsor his education.

The Team noted that their motivation was the fact that they were able to impact lives through their projects where widows

in particular were able to take care of their families.

On his part, the Director, Covenant University Centre for Entrepreneurial Development Studies (CUCEDS), Dr. Steven Oluwatobi, revealed that the project has taught the students how to succeed. "What they have learnt was a practical knowledge which they can't get from any textbook," he said.

He expressed appreciation to the University's management and the implementation partners including CEDS, Punch Newspaper, Co-creation Hub Nigeria, African Hub, Prestige Travels and Hebron FM among others for their tremendous supports at various levels of the competition.

Dr. Oluwatobi also expressed belief that the Team would come first in the next edition of the competition.
